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# Auxiliary Corner: Storming the Hill

Cherry blossoms and sunshine greeted nearly 170 participants who took part in the 2014 Storming the Hill event. The teams delivered the message to sustain the pay and benefits of our troops, reject TRICARE changes, and eliminate sequestration cuts.

For the second year, the proposed 1-percent pay cap failed to keep military pay comparable to the civilian workforce, as indicated by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Employment Cost Index. The past three military raises averaged less than 1.4 percent, and the pay raise in 2014 was the lowest in 50 years. The continued pay gaps between military and civilian pay ultimately affect retention and readiness.

The FY 2015 budget proposes consolidation of all TRICARE health care options into one option, with fee hikes affecting all military and retirees' families. These hikes would increase annual fees, impose means-testing, and increase pharmacy copayments. The FY 2012 and 2013 National Defense Authorization Acts increased fees, including pharmacy copayments, and required future increases to be tied to the military COLA. DoD documents support that military personnel and their health care costs are not the problem. In fact, the problem lies in the inefficiency and mismanagement within DoD. Any changes to TRICARE-fee law would represent a breach of faith with those who already have paid extraordinary premiums in sacrifice and service through their 20-plusyear military careers.

## How Can I Tell If a Charity Is for Real

It seems that with increasing frequency we're being asked to donate to "charitable" causes. While most of us probably enjoy helping a worthy cause, unfortunately, there are people who want to exploit our goodwill and, more specifically, our money.

The easiest way is to check its name and reputation at the Wise Giving Alliance, www.bbb.org/us/charity, operated by the Better Business Bureau or at Charity Navigator www.charitynavigator.org and GuideStar www2.guidestar.org.

Unless you previously donated to a particular organization and provided the organization with your e-mail address, assume that any e-mail seeking a donation is bogus. Don't click on links promising to guide you to its website, photos or other "evidence" of need for your money—these links are a common way for hackers to infect your computer with a virus. To see a charity's website, type its address yourself.

If you want to donate to a charity that phones you, always request that it first send you printed materials. Then authenticate the address and phone number through directory assistance or an Internet search. Mailed material is no guarantee of legitimacy, but organizations that won't provide it may well be a fake.

Never give a credit card or bank account number by phone unless you initiate the call.

Beware of sound-alike names. Many bogus charities mimic legitimate organizations.

Old-fashioned mailings are least likely to be scams, in view of the cost of postage. Be suspicious of mail from groups to which you haven't previously donated. The sender may have purchased a mailing list with your name and address, but so can scammers. If a mailing seems genuine, authenticate the organization at the websites noted above before donating.

In general, good charities spend less than 35 percent of donations on fundraising and administrative costs. (*Source: AARP.org*)

# Auxiliary Corner: Storming the Hill (cont.)

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
The proposed budget would slash commissary savings in the U.S. by 66 percent. For a family of four, this represents a loss of about \$3,000 in annual commissary savings. Additionally, a currently serving family would be required to pay 5 percent out of pocket for housing, an average cost of more than \$1,200 a year.

The proposed changes to military pay, basic allowance for housing, reduction in commissary savings, and the TRICARE fee changes would impact the annual purchasing power of an E-5 family of four by nearly \$5,000, and an O-3 family of four would lose about \$6,000 in purchasing power. MOAA strongly discourages changes to military pay and benefits prior to the report of the Military Compensation and Retirement Modernization Commission in February 2015.

Hill-stormers left congressional leadership and staff with fact sheets on concurrent receipt for disabled military retirees (S. 234 and H.R. 333), the Survivor Benefit Plan/Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset (S. 734 and H.R. 32), and the Guard/Reserve retirement issue (S. 240 and H.R. 690).



To call your legislators' offices toll-free, use MOAA's direct line to the congressional switchboard: (866) 272-6622. Then, ask the operator to connect you with your legislator's office, and ask to speak with the legislator's legislative assistant or military legislative assistant.
