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Robert Smalls: From escaped slave to House of Representatives

John is a retired Navy Captain, a 1975 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy and is a life member of MOAA, USNA AA, VFW, AMVETS and the DAV. He has served with distinction as a Veteran Service Officer. His volunteer support to veterans has been via the VFW and Florida Veterans Communities, providing Furniture and Furnishings to Veterans getting housing under the HUD-VASH program. He has lived on the Emerald Coast since 2005.

Chaplain's Corner

I'm going to skip highlighting Father's Day and underscore an equally important landmark holiday to veterans —the role of women in the Armed Services. In June 12,1948, President Truman signed "The Women Armed Services Integration Act." This opened the floodgates for patriotic women to serve in all regular active duty military services.

In my years of public service, we had great women chaplains and chaplain assistants who trained, worked, deployed, and raised their families all at the same time. Major General Lorraine Potter was our first 2 star Chief of Chaplains and a role model for men and women.

I was a swing and mid shift flight line chaplain and saw first hand the dextrous character of military women in uniform and civilian roles. They had many different names: "women warriors, shield maidens, and warrioress".

Did you know in the 1970's, 265,000 women have served in our great military, and that 11,000 were in Vietnam War (90% were nurses). Moreover, there are seven Army and one Air Force nurses whose names are engraved on the Vietnam Memorial Wall in WDC.

In our own Ft Walton backyard there is the Womens Memorial Veterans Park behind the Okaloosa Island convention center. It highlights 8 outstanding women from the Revolutionary War to the Global War on Terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan whose grit and determination were demonstrated as they fought side by side with men.

At the Air Force Academy I saw their fighting spirit in the summer training at Jack's Valley and throughout the year in sports, science and religious arenas.

My wife Mary served in the AF and concludes that the military was a positive life-enriching experience. She believes every American should give back 'public service' to our blessed nation.

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

Oliver Clyde Locke

Olive Clyde Locke, age 90, of Crestview passed away on Saturday, January 8, 2022, in Haymarket, VA. He was born in Laurel Hill, FL on June 16, 1931, to Elbert Lee & Olive Leona Locke. Clyde grew up in the Crestview area and

graduated from Crestview High School in 1951. He was the first member of his family to go to college and graduated from the University of Florida in 1955. In 1956 Clyde was commissioned as an officer in the United States Navy. During his military career Clyde had tours of duty on the aircraft carrier USS Lake Champlain, the submarine tender USS Proteus in Guam, and in Oakland, CA, Washington, DC, New York, Taiwan, the Pentagon and London. Clyde retired from the Navy in 1977 and began a second career at Westinghouse Corporation in Maryland. In 2004 he returned to reside in his hometown of Crestview, FL.

Clyde was a member of Woodlawn Baptist Church in Crestview. He was an avid gardener and enjoyed growing beautiful gardens of vegetables and flowers. Clyde was a proud member of the Northwest Florida Military Officers Association and was a true patriot and devoted to his Faith, Family and Freedom.

Clyde is survived by his wife of 61 years, Millicent Kay Locke; daughters: Francine Orr and husband Patrick, Marianne Healy and husband Tim; also surviving are his nine grandchildren: Ryan and wife Christina, Nathan, Noah, Caitlin, Juliette, Justin, Anna, Anneliese, and Jack; great-grandchild Olivia, along with many nieces & nephews.

Col. Lewis G. Aufdemorte, Jr.

Lewis G. Aufdemorte, Jr, Colonel, USAF (RET) died on May 13, 2022.

Lew was born in New Orleans on October 16, 1932, to Lewis and Mary Aufdemorte. He was married in Valley Stream NY for 69 years to the love of his life, Helen O'Rourke.

Lew served his country proudly, retiring from the United States Air Force in July 1980. In recognition of his service, Lew was awarded the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, Air Medal with 12 oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation medal, and Air Force Expeditionary Medal, in addition to other awards and devices.

Lew served two tours in Southeast Asia flying over 200 missions in the F-4 and A-7 aircraft.

Lew's military career took him and his family to Arizona, Germany, Nevada, Alabama, Virginia, Southeast Asia, South Carolina, Texas and Florida. During these assignments, Lew was a flight commander, fighter weapons school instructor, squadron commander, staff officer, and director of operations.

His last assignment was the Deputy Commander of Headquarters Tactical Air Warfare Center (TAWC), Eglin AFB.

He was a BMW enthusiast and enjoyed many years of Swift aircraft ownership. A proud supporter who was a member of the Dedalians, BMW Car Club of America, Aero Club, Gun Club, Northwest Florida Military Officers Association, and Experimental Aircraft Association.

Lew is survived by his loving wife, Helen, and son Lewis Aufdemorte, III and wife Holley of Myrtle Beach SC, and daughter Sunny Feeley and husband Bob Feeley of Shalimar FL and Bridgton ME. Lew had seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Community Outreach

Doolittle Raiders Final Goblet Ceremony: On April 18, 2022, the 80th anniversary of the Doolittle Raid on Tokyo, the Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce, Northwest Florida State College (NWFSC), and Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC) hosted the Final Goblet Ceremony at the Mattie Kelly Arts Center at NWFSC, to salute the combined Doolittle Raiders and, in particular, the last surviving Raider, Colonel Richard 'Dick' Cole, USAF, Ret. I and a few other NWFMOA chapter members attended this 1 ½ hour long 'spectacular' ceremony. The Raiders trained at Eglin AFB in 1942 and accomplished an unheard of launch of B-25 bombers from an aircraft carrier to bomb Tokyo on April 18, 1942.

The first Raider reunion occurred in December 1945 in Miami, Fl, hosted by General Doolitlle on his birthday. In 1947, the Raiders began their annual reunions on April 18th, a tradition that lasted over 70 years, meeting in various cities (inclluding Fort Walton Beach) throughout the U.S. In 1959, the City of Tucson, AZ, presented the Raiders with a set of sterling silver goblets, each engraved with the name of one of the 80 men who flew the mission. In 1973, Col. Dick Cole built a display case for the goblets. At the reunions, those gathered would toast their deceased Raiders and turn their goblet upside down in the display case. At the "Final Goblet Ceremony", dignitaries in attendance included Secretary of the Air Force Frank Kendall, Air Force Chief of Staff General Charles Q. **Brown**, the Commander of Air Force Special Operations Command, Lt Gen Jim Slife, and Commander, Air Education & Traning Command, Lt Gen Brad Webb. Also present were Colonel Cole's son, Dr. (Lt Col, USAF, Ret) Rich Cole, and daughter, Mrs. Cindy Chal (both of whom I was fortunate to talk with following the ceremony). Also recognized was 'our own' Mrs. Doris **Day**. During this final ceremony, the names of the five crew members of each of the 16 B-25s were read and responded to by active duty airmen of AFSOC. The Final Toast was given by Secretary Kendall as follows: "Ladies and Gentlemen, I propose a toast to the Doolittle Raiders who gave their all in service of their mission, and to those who have joined them since, our fondest memories, sincere appreciation and gratitude. May they Rest in Peace." Toast Response: "To Those Who

Have Gone." Following the toast. Colonel Dick Cole's goblet was handed to his daughter, Cindy, who turned it upside down and handed it to her brother, Dr. Rich Cole. Colonel Cole's goblet was the final one to be inverted, as he was the 'Last Man Standing'. I am fortunate to have personally met Colonel Cole on his visits to the Fort Walton Beach area in 2013 and beyond. He was a great man and a national hero. May he and all of the Doolittle Raiders Rest in Peace.

Doolittle's goblet, **Colonel Dick Cole's goblet** is in the first column, 2nd row. The goblet case was built by Col. Cole in 1973, lined with blue velvet in 16 columns, one for each B-25 crew and in the order they launched from the aircraft carrier, Hornet. The horizontal tiers are, from the top, each crew's pilot, co-pilot, navigator, bombardier, and gunner. Following the April 18th ceremony, this display was returned to the National Museum of the Air Force at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, and is displayed next to a restored B-25 bomber.


