Colonel Gilbert "Gib" Ahl began his 28-year Air Force career in August 1959 as an Aviation Cadet through the Navigator training program during a 6 period when the selection requirement of two years of college was suspended, and only satisfactory Air Force Officer Qualification Test (AFOOT) test scores were required. Although qualifying for pilot training, a devious recruiter convinced the naïve farm kid that entering Navigator training now was feasible with pilot training in

one year. He was commissioned a 2nd Lt and received his Navigator Wings in September 1960 and assigned to Strategic Air Command at Dow AFB as a KC-97 Navigator. He spent the next 6 years accumulating 1400 hours flying time and attending college classes at night. He received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Management from Southern New Hampshire University's first 4 year graduating class in 1966.

He was accepted for Pilot training in class 68-E at Moody AFB and awarded his pilot wings February 1968. He was selected to fly his boyhood dream of the F-100 Fighter and was assigned to Luke AFB. The next assignment was to the 612th TFS, 37th TFW at Phu Cat AB, South Vietnam in October 1968. After completing the minimum 100 combat missions he volunteered and was accepted as a member of the elite Forward Air Control unit of Operation Commando Sabre, commonly known by the now famous call sign Misty. Captain Ahl completed 80

missions as a Misty FAC for a total of 230 missions and 551.4 hours of combat during his one year combat tour of duty in Vietnam.

A series of operational and staff assignments followed to include Operations Officer of the 493rd TFS at RAF Lakenheath, and conversion to the F-4D, assignment to MacDill AFB in the 61<sup>st</sup> TFS as an Instructor

Pilot, assigned to the 314<sup>th</sup> AD Osan AB Korea as Chief of Operations Plans, back to MacDill as Operations Officer of the 63rd TFS and then 56th TFW Chief of Standardization and Evaluation. In 1981 he was assigned to the United States Military Training Mission (USMTM), Riyadh Saudi Arabia as Air Force Section

Deputy for Operations, followed by an assignment to United States Central Command (CENTCOM) Security Assistance Division. Colonel Ahl escaped CENTCOM after 2 years and was selected in 1984 as the 56th Tactical Fighter Training Wing Deputy Commander for Resources after which he retired in June 1987.

Colonel Ahl has combined 4400 hours of accident and incident free flight time as a Navigator in the KC-97, C-130, and as a Pilot/Instructor in the F-100 and F-4.

Decorations and awards include The Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Meritorious Service Medal with OLC, Air Medal with 10 OLC, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Commendation Medal with OLC, Presidential Unit Citation, National Defense Service, and Air Force Good Conduct Medal.





In January we held our annual Scholarship Fund Board of Directors meeting. The 2025 Board members are: **Dave Parisot**, President; **Kevin Kirby**, Vice-

President; George Colton, Secretary-Treasurer; Bob Allen, Fred Westfall; Karl Eschmann; and, Charles Farmer (Niceville JROTC). Our Financial Adviser remains Tess McLaughlin Bass of Bass, Byrd, and Associates at Merrill Lynch.

When the Board met in September 2023, we decided to offer 2-year scholarships to JROTC cadets of the seven local high schools we support, with the objective to retain them in college ROTC classes for a longer period and eventually leading to commissions in our armed forces. At their Junior or senior year in ROTC they become eligible to apply for one of our ROTC scholarships of \$4,000 each. The number of scholarships to be awarded in 2025 will depend on the number of applications we receive by March 1<sup>st</sup>. The JROTC scholarships will be valued at \$3,000 for each of two years (i.e., \$6,000 total for each cadet selected.) scholarship applications for 2025 are due on March 1<sup>st</sup>.

Thanks to NWFMOA member and Gold Club member **Larry Bush**, we have a new endowed scholarship, the "The Joan Bush Memorial Scholarship". Thank you, Larry for remembering your wife with this annual scholarship for local JROTC cadets

On March 1<sup>st</sup>, the Fort Walton Beach High School AFJROTC will be hosting a **drill competition** for four local high school JROTC units, i.e., Niceville, Walton, Gulf Breeze, and FWB. The drill competition will be held at Hurlburt Field in the commando Hangar (726 Cruz Avenue) with opening ceremonies starting at 8:00AM. ## Update

## THE CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE PROPOSES CHANGES TO TRICARE FOR LIFE

TFL enrollment is automatic once a beneficiary starts paying Medicare Part B premiums. There is no enrollment fee or monthly premium for TFL coverage.



#### **MILITARY**

A CBO proposal would require Medicare-eligible beneficiaries who choose to enroll in TFL to pay *an annual enrollment fee of \$610 for individual coverage or \$1,220 for family coverage*.

The enrollment fees would be indexed to grow at the same rate as average Medicare costs in later years.

# **TFL Cost Sharing**

The other CBO measure affecting TFL would introduce minimum out-of-pocket requirements, including an \$850 deductible – TFL would not cover any of the first \$850 of a beneficiary's Medicare cost-sharing. For the first \$4,250 in total medical expenses each year, Medicare would pay its 80% (or \$3,400) while the TFL beneficiary would be responsible for the full \$850 not covered by Medicare.

After the deductible was satisfied, TFL would cover only 50% of the next \$7,650 in Medicare costsharing. This means TFL beneficiaries could face *up to* \$4,675 *in cost-sharing per year*. Similar to the enrollment fee proposal, cost-sharing requirements would increase annually at the rate of Medicare cost increases.

# **Protecting Your Earned Benefit**

The options outlined in the CBO report come from various sources including past proposed legislation or budget proposals, congressional offices, federal agencies, and the private sector. "As a collection, the options are intended to reflect a range of possibilities, not a ranking of priorities or an exhaustive list," the report states. "Inclusion or exclusion of any particular option does not imply approval or disapproval by CBO, and the report makes no recommendations."

MOAA appreciates the importance of addressing the deficit, but our nation must fulfill obligations to those who serve a full career in uniform. We will fight any proposal that increases costs to seniors who rely on TFL for their health care. The TFL benefit was a key component of the compensation and benefits package that sustained the all-volunteer force throughout two decades of war – MOAA will also protect the future of TFL for current working-age retirees and career servicemembers who are counting on TFL as a critical part of their future retirement plans.

We will be monitoring for any signs that CBO's concepts have gotten traction. The administration budget request, due in February but sometimes delayed during the first year of a new administration, will likely give us our first glimpse at any potential proposals to increase TRICARE fees. Look for updates on these and other legislative issues in *The MOAA Newsletter* and at MOAA.org, and register at our Legislative Action Center so you can take part in upcoming grassroots efforts designed to preserve service-earned benefits.
